Latest News

The weather has changed from summer to fall during the last week of September this year. The official closure of the golf course was Friday, September 27, 2013.

Tom Duncan has resigned his seat on the Wrangell Golf Club Board of Directors. Rafael Nunez has been elected to fill the seat for the remaining term.

The Wrangell Schools art program has offered to refurbish the signage displayed at the entrance of Muskeg Meadows.

Steve Prunella has offered to donate a large cistern. Plans to obtain and install the water catchment system are currently underway. This cistern is much larger than the current water system being used at the golf course, which will help improve maintenance projects throughout the golf course.

Contractor, Lloyd Ward is currently finishing phase two of the covered motor cart parking. The project is very near completion. Rental stalls for the secured area are \$100/year.

Superintendant, Wayne Harding will be working after the closure of the season to refurbish the tee boxes throughout the golf course.

Wolford has plans to begin refurbishing the ramp and porch area of the tournament room as the golf season draws and end.

Muskeg Meadows had several returning golfers who come to Wrangell each summer to fish commercially, or guide hunting trips.

As summer progressed, those

folks became busy with their work and had less time to golf; however, new faces emerged. We had several golf tours booked through Alaska Vistas from golfers aboard the large cruise ships that visited Wrangell for the day. And several more golfers that visited Muskeg Meadows from the smaller cruises. The weather was fabulous, and new Muskeg Meadows banner flag displayed at City dock was inviting to several more guests to Muskeg Meadows who were touring Wrangell, and Southeast Alaska from around the world. The amount of young golfers that attended the youth golf events throughout this season were more than ever seen in the past. We seen large attendances for the Wrangell Parks and Recs summer youth program, Wrangell High School Golf Club, Petersburg Middle School exploratory day in Wrangell at Muskeg Meadows, and the Boy Scouts of America Youth Tournament. Unlike last year, where I hosted several fun competitions on the driving range for families with children, this year time did not permit, but regardless, the driving range turned out to be a hot item this year. Individuals often hit a bucket of balls on their lunch hour throughout the weekdays. And several families who are new to the game this year, had come out for a day of family time, practicing on the range together.

The Wrangell Golf Club Youth Leaders, Don and Bonnie Roher offered golf lessons for men, women, couples, and children several times throughout the summer. Their lessons always began on the driving range.

Also mentoring golf again this year for the ladies was club member, Kathy Sandness. And men's golf mentor, club member, Tom Wolford.

Faye Kohrt has also offered mentorship to children of all skill levels.

The tournament schedule this season was jammed packed with events each weekend, as well as some weekdays. Each tournament was a great success, but there were a few sponsors who kicked up the ante with extra prizes, contests and drawings. The first extra special event was the Angerman's Inc. and Outlet

After the game, Wrangell Medical Center hosts their dinner and auction where Miss Alaska is the guest speaker and auctioneer's assistant.

Another main attraction was the Elks Father's Day tournament and picnic. The format was geared towards families. This special family game led into a great picnic with bbq burgers and hot dog meals. The Elks and Emblem Club host several fun competitions for children, such as a sawdust pile dive for quarters, a putting contest and a driving range contest. Horseshoe tournaments, chipping con-

R&M Engineering provide a buffet picnic for the golfers during the tournament with a beefed-up manly menu of food and drinks. Stikine Sportsmen Association has requested to permanently host the Friday night golf event leading into R&M Engineering's tournament in the future.

The next big events were leading into the fourth of July. Ottesen's True Value hosted a spin on their format, straying away from the typical Best Ball they chose to host a Mystery Scramble. That kind of game is played as an individual handicap. The scorekeeper randomly draws names to put together four-person teams. Using each golfers handicap, the scorekeeper finds the average, and that figure will be given as the team handicap. The chosen team with the lowest net score wins.

The two most prestigious events are the Ryder Cup, Petersburg vs, Wrangell, which takes place at the beginning of the season, and the Club Championship which is at the end of the season. At these two events, serious golfers get together to compete for the title and trophy.

2014 is gearing up to include a new tournament sponsor. The Salty Dawg yacht races will be coming to Wrangell from Washington state. Boaters will start their race in the San Juan Islands of Washington state with their final destination in Wrangell, Ak, June 14, 15 and 16th. Their golf tournament will be Monday, June 16th.

While the golf events progressed throughout the season, course management had an issue with the ravens to contend with. The Rasmuson Foundation gave \$25,000 to the Wrangell Golf Club for course repair after the ravens devastated an entire fairway last year. Because of the extensive damage to the fairways this year, management modified the yardage and changed the pars

on two holes, which allowed the game to play around the damaged and healing areas.

Compared to last year, the damaged areas caused by ravens throughout the golf course were more frequent and severe. Management has an environmental friendly strategy for eliminating the raven's food source.

While course modifications, and the areas marked ground under repair were underway, it did not slow down the golfers.

Along with great weather and near perfect golfing conditions for most of the season, golfers got to enjoy new sets of golf club rentals. RAM brand clubs designed for beginner golfers. New sets for men and women in both left and right handed. Currently, Muskeg Meadows has approximately a dozen sets of junior golf club rentals in most sizes from toddler to preteen.

Also new this year to Muskeg Meadows is driving range netting, which was donated by Joe Plesha with Trident Seafoods. Although coordinating work efforts to get the net installed proved to be a challenge this year, current plans are to install the netting at the beginning of the 2014 golf season. This summer the new hardware on each pole was installed by the City of Wrangell Utility department with the use of their lift truck.

Construction projects were throughout the golf course this season. Some projects included a new motor cart garage and new steps to the back porches of the Proshop and driving range, resurfacing fairway number three, maintaining the raven damage and a fresh coat of paint to the front deck of the Proshop. More maintenance projects are sched-

uled for next season.
